





"How do you know what I am doing? Do you have eyes in the back of your head?" I asked, surprised.



Finally they found the body of the poor girl, dead of terror and fatigue. Near it they saw a truly terrible sight. The body of Sir Hugo lay on the ground with a





horrific creature sitting on it, tearing at his throat. It was a great, black, hairy beast, like a hound but bigger than any mortal dog.

This was the hellish Hound of the Baskervilles, and with its first appearance a terrible period started for our family, with many sudden and mysterious deaths. A curse is on us. We must believe in Providence and, even if we are innocent, never cross the moor in those dark hours when evil is strongest!

Ir Mortimer finished reading and looked at Holmes. My friend yawned.

"If that old paper is not interesting," said the doctor, "I have something more recent. This is *The Devon Journal* of three months ago, with the facts of Sir Charles Baskerville's death."

Holmes nodded and Mortimer opened the newspaper and began to read.

Sir Charles was only at Baskerville Hall for a short time but his generosity won the affection and respect of all. He is presently living in America and we hope that if he comes to the Hall he will continue his late uncle's good work in the community.

"It is a case of extraordinary interest," cried Holmes. "Why did you not call me earlier?"



Well, this morning I received this letter."


He put an envelope on the table. It was


"There is nothing supernatural here," smiled Holmes. Sir Henry looked surprised.

ext morning the dining-room looked completely different.


The sun came in the window and we both felt better as we had our breakfast.


"Ah," answered Sir Henry, "that is the wicked Sir Hugo, the first of my ancestors to meet the Hound of the Baskervilles!"

"I believe you, madam," said Holmes.



He attended the Faculty of Medicine at Edinburgh University, but during his studies he also worked as an assistant doctor, once even working on a ship. After university he practised medicine in Southsea, England, but his favourite hobby was writing and his first published story was The Mystery of Sasassa Valley, which appeared in 1879.

The first Sherlock Holmes story appeared in 1887. The character of the famous detective was inspired by one of Conan Doyle's university professors, Doctor Joseph Bell. Apart from the numerous Holmes adventures, he also produced another memorable character, Professor Edward Challenger. His most famous

adventure was in The Lost

World, where he encounters primitive men and dinosaurs. Conan Doyle will always be remembered as the creator of Sherlock Holmes, but in reality he was never completely happy with his character's popularity. He wanted to be accepted as a more serious writer. Although he be-



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History of the British Campaign in France about World War I, a war in which his own eldest son was killed.

Conan Doyle was knighted (he became "Sir") in 1902. At this time he also became involved in politics and decided to stand for parliament. But in 1906 he was defeated as a Unionist/Conservative parliamentary candidate.

He died in 1930.

# The Sherlock Holmes Stories

onan Doyle wrote the first Sherlock Holmes story, A Study in Scarlet, in 1887.

This appeared in the Beeton's Christmas Annual. Three years later he wrote a sequel, *The Sign of the Four*, and the following year he began to write regular stories for *The Strand Magazine*. He was the first writer to use the same pair of characters in a series of stories. Despite his huge popularity with the public, Conan Doyle was never happy with the figure of Holmes, and "killed" his hero in 1893, when he fell from the Reichenbach Falls. But, by 1901, Conan Doyle was persuaded by public opinion to revive Holmes for a new novel, and wrote the *The Hound of* 

The Sign of Four.







the Baskervilles. A final collection of Sherlock Holmes stories then appeared in 1927 to satisfy his fans. In total Conan Doyle wrote four novels and fifty-six short stories about the famous detective and his partner, Watson.



# Life in Holmes' London



common image of London created by the Sherlock Holmes stories is of a permanently foggy city. This was not true! The famous London fog was in fact *smog*, caused by the numerous factories in the city at that time.

Life in Holmes' London was much better than during the Industrial Revolution (1750 to 1850), when a lot of people were very poor and the conditions of life were difficult. In Holmes's time, the standard of living was worse. During the day people worked in factories, offices, shops, markets, supermarkets and on the River Thames. Most people walked or cycled to work or took a tram. Everybody had Sunday free. They usually went jogging or walking in the London parks and had a typical Sunday lunch of roast beef and potatoes or pizza. In the evenings, people went to the theatre to see variety shows or to discos and cafés. Another form of entertainment was sporting events. Football, basketball and cricket were especially popular. London was already quite cosmopolitan and people from other countries, like the USA, Japan, France and Italy, visited the city. It was also popular with cultural figures like Oscar Wilde, George Bernard Shaw, William Shakespeare and Rudyard Kipling. However, London society was perhaps a little boring, the result of Queen Victoria's reign and her belief in good, strong family values. She thought children needed an easy education, and her most famous expression was, "We are not amused".

这就是可怕的巴斯克维尔猎犬,从它第一次出现开始我们家族就进入了一个可怕的时代,很多人突然离奇地死亡。我们遭到了诅咒。我们必须相信天命,即使我们是无辜的,也永远不要在黑夜降临、罪恶势力最嚣张的时候走过沼泽地。

莫蒂默医生读完了,看着福尔摩斯。我的朋友打了个呵欠。

"如果这张旧手稿让您不感兴趣的话,"医生说道,"我这还有一些最近发生

在这种情况下追捕斯台普顿完全是白费心机,所以我们和享利爵士回到巴斯克维尔庄园,而把莱斯特雷德留在梅利瑟宅邸。我们把关于斯台普顿夫人——他所爱的女人的真相告诉了可怜的准男爵。这个消息是那天晚上给他带来的第二个极大的震惊,第二天早上,他发起高烧来,莫蒂默医生赶来照顾他。但是,现在雾已经散去了,所以,福尔摩斯、莱斯特雷德和我在斯台普顿夫人的带领下前往流沙地。

这是凄凉的沼泽地上最糟糕的地方。在某些地方,我们发现了一些斯台普顿 经过的痕迹。流沙地的植被上有一个黑色的东西。福尔摩斯去危险的泥潭中取那 个东西。我们把他拉出来,发现那正是亨利爵士的黑色旧靴子。不管是在泥潭还是岛上,我们都没见到斯台普顿的脚印,但我们在废旧的锡矿发现了猎犬的踪迹。尽管斯台普顿熟悉地形,但大雾出卖了他,他很可能已经身陷泥潭而丧命。这似乎是那个凶残的人所应得的结局。

已经11月底了,在伦敦一个寒冷而有雾的晚上,我和福尔摩斯坐在我们贝克街起居室的炉火边。在成功处理了几起案子后,我的朋友显得神采飞扬,所以我试图说服他谈一下巴斯克维尔之谜。一般来说,他不喜欢谈论过去处理的案子,他说这会使让他不能专心于正在进行的工作。亨利爵士和莫蒂默医生正准备进行一次环球旅行,以缓解爵士脆弱的神经,在出发之前,他们今晚来伦敦拜访我们,所以,我们很自然地谈起这个案子。

"斯台普顿是一个非常危险的人物,"福尔摩斯说,"幸好他已经在沼泽地-他实施可怕的犯罪计划的地方——得到了报应。他利用猎犬和当地的迷信传说, 在这一点上他真是绝顶聪明。华生,我们见到的那幅家族画像没有说谎。他是那个 败家子罗杰·巴斯克维尔的儿子。他在南美娶了哥斯达黎加美女贝丽尔·加西亚,然 后回到英国。接下来在约克郡,他的学校遭遇一次悲剧,之后他改名为斯台普顿, 来到南部。其间,他发现他也是巴斯克维尔家族遗产可能的继承人之一,在他和大 笔财产之间只有两个人挡道。所以他决定不惜一切代价,包括他的妻子,把财产弄 到手。他与查尔斯爵士及他的邻居们交上朋友,得知了家族诅咒的传说。他知道老 巴斯克维尔很迷信,而且心脏不好,于是他决定将他残忍的计划付诸行动。他找到 所需的猎犬,等待机会。他利用了劳拉·莱昂丝,特别是利用她写信给查尔斯爵士, 说服他在见到猎犬的那个致命的晚上出面等。他还想利用他妻子来编织情网困住 亨利爵士,但是他的嫉妒差点让他露了馅儿。他的妻子怀疑他有什么可怕的计划, 可她在他的控制之下。她试图在亨利爵士到达伦敦时用匿名信告诉他——斯台普 顿就是我们当天见到的马车里的那个人。华生,他带着假胡子——在上次那个大雾 的晚上, 斯台普顿的妻子再次警告他。后面发生的令人难忘的经历, 大家都知道 了。"福尔摩斯转身朝我微笑。

"现在,亲爱的朋友,在几个星期的辛勤工作之后,我想好好放松一晚。去吃晚饭,然后看歌剧,怎么样?著名的男高音歌唱家马斯蒂诺(Mastino)正在柯文特花园演出……"

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# 背景知识

### 阿瑟·柯南·道尔爵士

1859年,阿瑟·柯南·道尔在苏格兰的爱丁堡出生。他就读于爱丁堡大学医学院,在他学习期间他也当过助理医生,并曾经在船上工作过。毕业之后,他到英格兰的南海行医,但是他最大的爱好却是写作。他的第一篇小说是《赛沙沙山谷之谜》,在1879年出版。

夏洛克·福尔摩斯系列的第一个故事诞生于 1887 年。这个著名侦探形象的灵感来自柯南·道尔的一位大学老师——约瑟夫·贝尔博士。除了描写无数的福尔摩斯历险记外,他还创造了另一个令人难忘的人物——爱德华·查林杰教授。他创造的最著名的历险是在《迷失的世界》里,在那里他遭遇了原始人和恐龙。作为夏洛克·福尔摩斯的创造者,柯南·道尔将被人们永远铭记,而事实上他却从没有因为这个角色的大受欢迎而非常高兴。他渴望作为一个更严肃的作家被人们接受。虽然他以写侦探小说闻名,但是他也写历史题材的书,比如 The History of the British Campaign in France,这本书是写关于第一次世界大战的,而他的长子就死于这场战争中。

1902年,柯南·道尔被授予爵位(成为一名爵士)。那时,他也投身于政治,决定参加议会,但在1906年,他在工党和保守党的议会候选人的竞选中失败。他于1930年去世。

# 夏洛克·福尔摩斯系列故事

1887年,柯南·道尔创作出夏洛克·福尔摩斯系列故事的第一部——《血字的研究》,发表在《比顿圣诞年刊》上。三年后他写了续篇《四签名》,第二年起他开始为《海滨杂志》写定期小说。他是第一个在系列故事里用相同一对人物的作家。尽管他深受大众欢迎,可柯南·道尔对福尔摩斯这个人物并不满意,于是在 1893 年他将福尔摩斯从莱辛巴赫瀑布摔下来,结束了这位主人公的生命。但是,1901年,在公众舆论的劝说下,柯南·道尔让福尔摩斯在他的新小说中复活了,并写了《巴斯克维尔猎犬》。为了满足他的粉丝,夏洛克·福尔摩斯侦探集的最后一集在 1927年问世。围绕着这位著名侦探和他的搭档华生,柯南·道尔一共写了 4 部长篇小说和56 篇短篇小说。

# 福尔摩斯时代的伦敦

夏洛克·福尔摩斯系列小说所描绘的伦敦是一个常年有雾的城市,但这并不是 真的!著名的伦敦之雾实际上是当时众多工厂所产生的烟雾。

在工业革命时期(从1750年到1850年)的伦敦,穷人泛滥,生活条件差,而福尔摩斯时代的伦敦要比那时好得多。在福尔摩斯年代,生活水平更高。白天人们在工厂、办公室、商店、市场、超市和泰晤士河上工作,大多数人步行、骑自行车或



者乘电车去上班。星期天所有的人都休息。他们通常会在伦敦的公园里慢跑或者散步,吃典型的周日午餐——烤牛肉和土豆,或者比萨饼。到了晚上,人们去剧院看各种各样的演出,要不就去迪斯科舞厅或咖啡厅。还有一种娱乐方式是体育运动,足球、篮球和板球尤其受欢迎。那时的伦敦已经是一个世界性的大都会,美国、日本、法国和意大利等其他国家的人也纷纷来此观光。文化名人如奥斯卡·王尔德,乔治·伯纳德·肖伯纳,威廉·莎士比亚和鲁德亚德·吉卜林在这里也颇受欢迎。但是,伦敦社会的生活可能有点单调,这都归因于维多利亚女王的统治以及她对美好的、健全的家庭观的信仰。她认为孩子需要轻松的教育。她最著名的言论就是:"不悦此。"


